

GUIDE FOR AUTHORS

Scope

The Conference Proceedings of the **Annual Conference of the European Association of Psychology and Law, 2019**, will consist of empirical researches, meta-analytic reviews and systematic reviews of topics dealing with Psychology and Law (e.g., legal decision making, eyewitness).

Neither the Editors nor the Publisher will accept responsibility for the views or statements expressed by the authors. The proceeding book is aimed to researchers, academics and professionals in Psychology, Law, Social Work, Forensic Sciences, Educators and, in general, people related with Social Sciences and Law.

Language

Exclusively in English. English must be correct. If the paper was not originally written in English, translations be done by a professional translator. If English is not your native language and you wrote the paper in English, use a professional proof reading.

Length

The length will range from a **minimum** Of 3000 words to a **maximum** of 5000. The manuscript must be structured, according to APA style (6th Edition), into the following sections: Abstract, Introduction, Method, Results and Discussion (for subsections, reviews or other see the APA style manual).

Proposal submission

Manuscripts should be submitted electronically to the Proceeding Editors to eapl2019@gmail.com **before May 1, 2019** (deadline) Submissions implies that it represents original work (not previously published), that it is not being considered elsewhere for publication and that it will not be submitted to other publication while it is under evaluation by the Conference Proceedings of the Annual Conference of the European Association of Psychology and Law, 2019. The opinions and statements published are the responsibility of the authors, and such opinions and statements do not necessarily represent the policies of the European Association of Psychology and Law or the views of the Editors.

Review

The manuscripts will be reviewed by two blind referees. The reviews are anonymous for authors and reviewers. Author identities will be removed before sending out a manuscript to the reviewers.

Copyright

Authors submitting a manuscript do so with the understanding that if it is accepted for publication the copyright of the manuscript, including the reproduction of the paper in all forms and media, shall be transferred to the publisher (by signing the copyright and originality declaration form).

Style

Manuscripts must be adhered to the instructions on references, tables, figures, abstract, format, narrative style, etc. as described in the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (6th edition, 2010). Manuscripts that do not fit to the style set forth in this manual will not be considered for publication.

Check list of requirements

Chapter title: It should be simple and concise expressing the topic, variables or issues under research. The recommended length is not more than 12 words.

Running head: Abbreviate the article title for the top of the pages of the manuscript. The maximum length is 50 characters including letters, punctuations and spaces.

Abstract: The abstract is the access window of readers to the paper. Thus, prepare it carefully. It should be clear and easy to read with enough detail to help the reader understand what the article is about. The key elements for an experimental/research articles are: study purpose, brief description of the participants, methodology, study location (if relevant as for example if the legal context mediates the results), results, conclusions or implications. The abstract should be 150-250 words.

Keywords: Provide 4 or 5 keywords. These should express the precise content of the manuscript.

Title page: It includes the authors byline, institutional affiliations, article title, running head and author note (complete department affiliation, acknowledgements and correspondence author with mailing address and e-mail).

Full text: It includes, in a separate page, article title, abstract and keywords. Then, the full text. Text should be presented double spaced with numbered pages and anonymized for blind peer review.

References: List references in alphabetical order. Follow the style described at 6th edition of Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association. Check that all the text references are in the list of references, and *vice versa*.

Tables and figures: These will be placed at the end of the paper or attached separately. Introduce a suggestion of entrance for each table and figure into the text.

Copyright transfer: Authors must transfer the copyright and guarantee the originality of the publication to the Editors and Publishers. Download the form and send it signed with the manuscript to (eapl2019@gmail.com).

Ethical Standards

The Editors and Publisher subscribe to the ethical standards of the American Psychological Association, and the legal framework of the country where the research was developed.
